Ben Gurion University -Learning Health

The Ben Gurion branch started a new joint project with the department for health inequality reduction.

We know today that socio-economic status dramatically affects people's health. Unfortunately, things like lack of knowledge and information, language barriers, or an absence of a supportive environment, can negatively influence people's health, curtail their ability to mitigate risk factors, and even worsen existing conditions. In a new collaborative move with the Ministry of Health, led by Ben Gurion University, we've developed five unique, tailor-made summer corses on the subject of health and social disparities. The objective is to help learners expand their knowledge and understanding of health-promoting activities, so that they can become health ambassadors in their own communities.

In total, 560 learners participated in summer workshops held in all four universities,

developed and guided by some of this year's program instructors.

The minister of health, Nitzan Horowitz, parliament member Michal Rozin, as well as other prominent figures from the Ministry of Health, honored us with their presence at the project's opening ceremony, in which we discussed:

- Nutrition and a healthy lifestyle
- Optimal stress and anxiety management
- Addiction and its effects in the 21st century
- Health entrepreneurship how to promote health in your community
- The early years of life





About our studentinstructors

Our participant-pupils (15 in Ben-Gurion, 14 in Haifa, 15 in Jerusalem and 22 in Tel Aviv) came to the program after a long screening process, which includes filling forms, group assessment meetings, and personal interviews. At the end of this process, we ended up with a group of motivated, dedicated and imaginative people.

The semester started with five preparation weeks which included the introduction of content, tools and general information meant to prepare the participants for what lies ahead. They met with other participants, track coordinators and former instructors, learned about Access for All classes, constructed the start of the Syllabus and acquainted themselves with one another. Once the program begins, an instructor's week includes staff meetings, active participation in an academic workshops, preparing lesson plans, and, of course teaching — this year, often in different locations. Attendance in the program stands between 8–10 weekly hours on average. Our participant–pupils' sense of responsibility and commitment allowed us to send them back into the Israeli society with a smile and mask, even during the Covid pandemic.





"For me, the program manifests the essence of academia and its ideal vision — promulgating knowledge to everyone, without exception. It is a symbol of equal opportunity, compassion and tolerance. It reinforces the fact that there is no such thing as complete altruism: when you give with all your heart, you always receive something in return. The academic course that the students-instructors study themselves engages in social justice issues, personal responsibility and the responsibility of the state, theories about adult education, a dialogic discourse, and a mirroring of the Israeli society. The seminar is a meeting place for group and individual learning and connects the program to broad social action.



"It has been a much more meaningful experience than I had expected. I teach an all-women class, most of whom are mature, religious, or even orthodox. At first, I was worried I might come off as condescending, which led me to set up distance between us, for fear of being rejected. 

Last year we launched a pilot class consisting of Arabic speaking women, led by a Hebrew speaking instructor aided by a translator. This year, we have decided to expand and streamline the project by opening two Arabic speaking classes – one in psychology and one in law – led by Arabic speaking instructors.

Both instructors grew up in East Jerusalem, and have learned to speak Hebrew in order to attend the Hebrew University; setting a personal example of achievement and ambition for their pupils. We plan to further develop this pilot in the future in order to respond to the high demand for higher education we see in East Jerusalem.
